


MSMS Radiates Ruby

MOOCs by UNESCO MGIEP


UNESCO MGIEP in collaboration with MSMS offered amazing module based online courses designed for youth across the world.

The activity helped in understanding the theme of the stated poem better.




National Organ Donation Day



Through his interview in the video, he conveyed a message for the students in India to write and share their heart warming anecdotes and letters.

The activity helped them to understand that writing letters enables us to express our thoughts and feelings through writing. In this digital age of text and emails, when people don't think much about writing letters, our students got an opportunity to understand the relevance and also the key benefits of writing letters. Some of the benefits are it's a screen free activity, great for mental well being, boosts cognitive skills enhances emotional development and strengthens relationships.









Art Integrated Learning (AIL) is a framework of experiential learning which provides an equitable learning environment for all learners through their own access points. Students engage in art activities and construct personal meaning through their learning in an art integrated environment.

Art Integration Project


Theme: Dance forms of Sikkim


The project was indeed a great learning experience as learners could make relevant connections and construct knowledge of themes.
